If you notice, the liturgical deacon is wearing a new **dalmatic**. The dalmatic garment has been in use since the 2nd century, and is worn by a deacon in the Eucharistic liturgy. In our liturgy it will function to clearly indicate the liturgical deacon, and also to add liturgical colour to the worship.

The use of a “**prayer bowl**” (a musical instrument) has been introduced to the Wednesday Eucharist to indicate the times for silent meditation & contemplation after the homily and after communion.

Grumbling & griping are poisonous. Grumbling works like a poison that penetrates the community. Grumblers look for one another & strengthen each other, & whose griping sickens the community. The antidote: good words spoken well & cheerfully work like balm for the soul. Cheerfulness works infectiously & can help to tackle any task before the community.
